## Dickson stays strong to earn rain-affected draw

SOMERSET batter Sean Dickson scored an unbeaten 77 as his side drew with Hampshire in the Rothesay County Championship.

Hampshire continued unbeaten start and Somerset their winless opening at the Utilita Bowl.

Dickson, Tom Abell and the weather quelled any chances of a final day route to a positive result in either direction - with a total of 175 overs, or around five sessions, lost in the match.

Dickson ended up unbeaten on 77, and Abell 27, after a 56-run partnership which had wiped out Hampshire's lead and taken Somerset away from any danger of losing.

Ben Brown's side took 13 points from the match, to Somerset's 11, to display a healthy 43 points from their opening three rounds and remain within touching distance of the Division One pacemakers.

Somerset head coach Jason Kerr said: "Overall we are pleased. We have played some really good cricket, especially the character after being six down overnight on the first day and then bowling them out on the third day to give us the opportunity to potentially win the game.

We succumbed to the weather today but it was good to see Dickson, Abell and Lammonby take their opportunity in a pressurised situation. Unfortunately the weather won.

Dickson has played brilliantly over the last two days. We know it is incredibly challenging opening the batting. He and Archie go through two quality bowlers, it is difficult, and looking at the context of the game it was worth more than the runs on the board.

"You are always disappointed

because you want to win every game you play, but I am not disappointed with the cricket we are playing. Hopefully within the next four games of this block we can get a couple of wins."

Women SOMERSET announced that Olivia Barnes, Jess Hazell and Erin Vukusic will each spend time on loan, dual-registered with other counties over the coming weeks. Left-arm spinner Barnes will join Kent, wicket-keeper/batter Hazell links up with Gloucestershire, whilst right-arm seamer Vukusic will represent Glamorgan. Barnes and Hazell will be available for selection up until May 15, whilst Vukusic is initially available to Glamorgan for this weekend's fixture only. All three remain available for Somerset.

**SWIMMING** YEOVIL & District Swimming Club has enjoyed a busy few weeks, with swimmers of all ages and abilities competing at various meets across the South West and beyond.

Following on from the Somerset County Championships, where several of the more experienced swimmers reached finals and won medals, March saw swimmers competing at various levels every weekend.

A large contingent travelled to Wales in Round Three of the Cotswold Swimming Series, whilst coach Emma Stacey took some of the younger swimmers to Chard on the same weekend - giving many of them their first experience of com-

petition. The following week, a group of nearly 30 YDSC swimmers took to the water in Dorchester to compete in the Poole Swimming Club Regional Qualifier. There were some fantastic performances, with plenty of personal bests and over 50 medals won. Eliza Randall (10) and William Martin (11) were both taking part in their first open meet and each achieved five personal bests. Eliza also gained a county qualifying time in the 50m

Five swimmers competed in the Chelsea & Westminster SC Level 1 meet at Millfield Pool in Street the next week, and came away with three bronze medals against strong competition. Jackson Green finished third in 1,500m freestyle, Rebecca Tomkins in 100m breaststroke and Dexter Scott in 50m breaststroke.

Aquatics Club Spring into Regionals Open Meet, saw 13 YDSC swimmers compete at the venue which hosted the 2022 Commonwealth Games swimming and diving events. The YDSC swimmers gave it their all, delivering 58 personal bests, three medals and countless moments of resolve and resilience.

For many, this was their first experience racing in a 50m pool and they rose to the challenge brilliantly learning, adapting and giving their absolute best.

One of the highlights of the year for many clubs is YDSC's Spring Fling which takes place every year at Millfield, which provides the perfect stage for the short-course level 3 meet for swimmers of all ages and

Taking place just before the regional window cut-off, the meet also gives swimmers one of the last chances to qualify for the English Regional Championships. The everpopular meet, held at the end of March, featured tough competition from 30 clubs across the region.

YDSC swimmers delivered outstanding performances and showed incredible determination in the pool, winning an impressive 37 medals including ten golds. There was another standout performance from Jackson who secured medals in six of the seven events he competed in, including gold in 400m, 200m and 50m freestyle.

Roisin Lafferty (9), Aidan Koheeallee (12), Coco Bowen (15) and Ellen Byrne (17) also won gold medals. Further afield at the Sandwell Amelia Knaggs (10) was competing

in her first open meet and achieved personal bests in all three of her events, while Olivia Swain (12) achieved an impressive seven personal bests from seven events. Thanks were given to everyone involved in making the weekend a success.

Head coach Ian Angell said: "At Yeovil we have such a wide range of swimmers, from those just beginning their competitive journey through to older swimmers who are getting ready to move on to universi-

"We have had a busy month of catering for every level of swimmer, from some of our younger swimmers competing for the first time alongside those seeking regional or even national qualifying times.

"What is great to see is that whatever the level, everyone comes together, cheering each other on, celebrating the wins and commiserating the losses. It really is one big family."
